Supporting Children with Roots in Ukraine and Russia

Every day the news and social media are filled with difficult images of the families and children directly impacted by Russia's invasion of Ukraine. How does this affect those families whose children were adopted from Ukraine or Russia? This war can be especially difficult for those families, particularly the children who may have some memory of their home country and worry about birth families, friends, or acquaintances still living there.

The National Council for Adoption (NCFA) recently held a free webinar entitled "Supporting People in the Adoption Community with Roots in Russia and Ukraine."* During this webinar, experts from several agencies spoke about how parents may be able to help navigate this sensitive time with their adopted children, many who are now teens or young adults. Below are some highlights from the webinar.

Whether adopted from Russia or Ukraine, children of all ages may be experiencing feelings of grief, loss, fear, and sadness. Think about the child who may have lived in an orphanage in the Ukraine in their early years. Seeing war images on TV or social media may bring back feelings of their own past traumas. Younger children may not realize what they are feeling, but such feelings may manifest in various ways, such as being distracted at home or school and/or being less interested in playing with friends. Children may not always share their feelings with others.

For Russian adoptees that may now be in college or employed, the negative images and press portraying their home country as the "bad guys" is extremely difficult. They may also be experiencing anti-Russian stigmas and prejudice. Some may even downplay their Russian heritage.

So if our children have roots in Ukraine or Russia, what can adoptive parents do to help them?

First, we need to acknowledge that we are ALL experiencing a sense of grief, loss, sadness, and helplessness, whether or not we have roots in those countries. We want to help our children navigate through these often complex emotions.

CPFA Awards 2022 Scholarship

Congratulations to Zandra Thomas on being awarded the 2022 CPFA Scholarship! Ms. Thomas is a graduate student at Kean University expecting to earn her MSW degree in 2023. During the pandemic, her focus changed from a career in the Newark public schools to working on obtaining her MSW. Ms. Thomas has personal experiences



in foster care, and hopes to use these in combination with her education to work for NJ State Child Protective Services. Her current field placement is with Integrity House at the Hudson County Correction and Rehabilitation Center where she has demonstrated her enthusiasm to learn and adeptness at applying her social work skills.

The four-day educational conference presented by the North American Council on Adoptable Children (NACAC) will be held online. It will cover a wide variety of foster care and adoption topics—to meet the diverse needs and levels of experience of adoptive and foster parents, child welfare professionals, and people who were adopted or in foster care.

CCAl Intern

Meet April Barcus, a junior at Rutgers University-Newark, who was selected as one of nine foster youth to serve as a legislative intern this summer for the Congressional Coalition on Adoption Institute (CCAI).

CCAI works with the largest bipartisan caucus, the Congressional Coalition on Adoption, made up of 161 members of the 117th



United States Congress and Senate. CCAI works to keep members informed on policy issues related to children and families in the United States and around the world.

April will be in Washington for nine weeks this summer. Monday-Thursday, they will be working as a legislative intern, and each Friday they will research and produce a policy report on "issues affecting children and youth in the U.S. foster care system." April plans to research the intersection of trauma and chronic conditions and its impact on care in the system. At the end of the nine weeks, the interns will have a policy briefing with members of Congress.

Supporting Children Continued

Parents may say, "Everything will be fine, don't worry about it" or conversely, they may get too emotionally involved and make it a stressful situation at home. Neither is helpful.

What is helpful is creating a safe space to allow your children to talk and express their feelings. Offering frequent "check-ins" with your child may be an effective way to help them verbalize and process what is taking place. It may take a few attempts for your child to open up, but when they do, validate their feelings and experiences.

Talking with and supporting older Russian adoptees may be more complex. As adoptive parents, we teach our children to have pride in their home country, rich culture, and its people. During these difficult times, some adoptees may feel anger with their home country and even reject their birth identity. We can empathize with their anger and offer emotional support. If your child is away at college, talking over the phone may not be enough; consider visiting your child at school as a way to "check-in" and be available for them.

Self care is also very important for adoptive parents. Maintaining good connections with our children and family members as well as setting limits on how much news and social media we view is vital to not becoming overly consumed by the war.

This is not an easy time for anyone, but with open communication, increased patience, and the help of a professional if needed, we will get through this. And don't forget to give a lot of hugs!
